The cost of the workshop is £200 per person (£120 for those in full time education). This figure offers excellent value and includes all course fees, lunch on all three days, dinner on the first night, refreshment breaks, and travel on Thursday.

David Bruce-Payne Formerly Organist and Master of the Choristers, Birmingham Cathedral. Music Festival Adjudicator and examiner for the ARBSM.

Ian Curror has had extensive teaching experience in the London music colleges and as a private teacher, specialising in preparing students for the diploma examinations of the RCO. He is active as a performer, having given organ recitals during 2014 in Totnes, Dartmouth, London and Paris.

Alex Davies studied organ at Trinity College of Music, London. He has held positions at both Brecon Cathedral and Blackburn Cathedral but has now returned to his roots in Lyme. Alex is organist at the parish church and is Musical Director of the Lyme Bay Chorale.

David Davies is Assistant Director of Music at Exeter Cathedral and previously held a similar position at Guildford Cathedral. David received his Master of Music degree in organ performance at Yale University, USA.

WHAT TO PREPARE FOR THE COURSE

The tutors suggest that each participant should prepare up to two or three short pieces, or excerpts from longer pieces, in advance. Five minutes should be the limit for each piece. When choosing pieces it helps to play relatively straightforward music really well, rather than challenging works that run into trouble under the stress of public performance.

For the accompaniment of the Lyme Bay Chorale (Thursday evening) four chosen participants will receive music in advance.
